Looking forward, the editorial board would welcome submissions for consideration for Issue 5 of Artefact. The deadline for the submission of articles is Monday, 2 May. In a new departure the board has announced an exhibition review competition aimed particularly at students in taught MA programmes related to visual studies. The reviews can be of any exhibition held in Ireland or abroad in 2011 and the winning submission will be published in the next edition of Artefact. It is hoped that this initiative will allow students in a relatively unadvanced stage of research the opportunity to publish.

Liverpool: the Art and Architecture of the Grand Tour

This lecture will explore context, concerns and the connections between Liverpool and her citizens, and the classical influences of Greek and Roman art and archaeology on the architecture of the city. This theme addresses the manner in which Liverpool was predisposed towards external classical influences during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Leading architects who were particularly concerned not just to imitate but to build upon Classical architecture in a modern context were most notably John Foster and C.R. Cockerell. So too William Roscoe and Henry Blundell, significant patrons of the arts and collectors were forthright in bringing Athens and Rome and the grandeur associated with the classical arts of Greece and Rome to Liverpool. Liverpool's pre-eminence as global commercial power set a claim to be the rightful heir to the mantle of ancient Athens. Like Athens, the habit of nurturing a tradition of civic pride through a culture of public architecture developed in Liverpool.

The committee hopes to re-offer the short trip to Liverpool in the early autumn (a circular will go out during the summer) and this lecture will perhaps provide an enticing taster to the trip, which would incorporate the forthcoming René Magritte: *The Pleasure Principle* exhibition which opens at Tate Liverpool in June, the first major exhibition of the Belgian Surrealist in the UK in some 20 years.

Castle Ward, Co Down & the Highlanes Gallery, Drogheda

Castle Ward in Co Down is set in an 820 acre walled demesne overlooking Strangford Lough. It is a unique eighteenth-century house built in two contrasting architectural styles. The entrance front is executed in the Classical style, while the garden front was built in the Gothic style. The duality in style continues throughout the interior of Castle Ward. We have a tour arranged to take us through this fascinating house.

En route back to Dublin we will visit the Highlanes Municipal Art Gallery in Drogheda which opened in 2006 in the former Drogheda Franciscan Church and Friary. Since then the Highlanes has served as the dedicated visual art space for the Irish north east region exhibiting the Drogheda Municipal Art Collection (DMAC). In addition it programmes a number of temporary exhibitions and at the time of our visit there will be a new exhibition of paintings by Sinéad Ní Mhaonaigh.

We have a coach organized to take us from & return us to Merrion Square – departure 8.30am prompt. Morning refreshments & lunch are arranged.

The Ulster Museum

Until 30 Jan: Renaissance to Romanticism: Old Master Paintings - an exhibition of the museum's Old Masters Collection with works by Flemish, Dutch, Italian and British artists, including Turner's Dawn of Christianity (Flight into Egypt).

Until 1 May: A new order: Twentieth-century Irish art – an exhibition themed around images of Figure, Place and Imagination. It features some of the best-loved and most important pieces from the Ulster Museum collection. Also on display are two recent acquisitions by the museum of works by Willie Doherty, a series of forty photographs of Belfast and Ghost Story, first shown at the Venice Biennale in 2007.
